

Premise:

Withdrawing into Oneself vs. Going out into the World: The twin dilemmas of life, the complementary modes of existence. This is a study of architecture as a tool for understanding oneself and one's place in the world. It would involve field trips; explorations & excursions, both literal and intellectual - into unfamiliar lands, cultures, ways of thinking and seeing the world.

A *Great Introversion* happened roughly a 100 years ago. As siblings of modern psychology and existential philosophies, modern(ist) art and architecture mostly turned away from the society/city, and became the manifestation of the newly discovered internal universe of each individual. This urge/tendency still remains deep in our DNA.

If the early 20th century saw a withdrawal into oneself, what we see now is artists and architects re-immersing themselves in society. Whether it is the "Social Practice" artists like Theater Gates or Natalie Jeremijenko, or architects/collectives like Alejandro Aravena and Assemble, the role seems to be shifting from that of the introverted lone genius into a humble and open collaborator and community orchestrator. This studio will be an exploration through design into the constantly changing and evolving role of the modern architect in the society.

Part I: A Place Of One's Own

(first 4 weeks...)

Objectives:

- Understanding architecture as an exploration/expression of the self, through space and materials;
- Exploring the complex relationships between private and public realms
- Learning the history/context of that approach and philosophy and how it has shaped the contemporary built environment as well as the way we think about buildings and cities.

Product: Architectural design expressed through drawings & models.

<u>Part II: the Architect in the Community</u> – A Study/Immersion/Intervention into a Community & Culture (...rest of the semester)

Objectives:

- Learn from a community, culture and the people
- Learning to observe, to ask the fundamental questions, the right questions
- Understanding the expanded role artists/architects are taking in 21st century society that goes well beyond traditional design.
- Understanding the potential as well as the limitations of arch/design to be a tool for dealing with the complex social, political, economic and cultural forces that shape our society and life.

Process:

- Case studies of contemporary social practices in art and architecture
- Research into the history as well as the current circumstances of the chosen neighborhood/region
- Devising systems and strategies for successful interventions in the community
- The process will include interacting with the people from the community as well as activists/leaders working on addressing the various issues and needs of the time and place.

Product:

Designing systems/strategies that address urban/social issues; Architectural interventions at the specific spots to be expressed through drawings/models and/or installations at those locations.
