# Director's Note

In 1920, Carl Meyer and Hans Janowitz wrote a story about the question of power – how it can be abused with seemingly good intentions, and the responsibility of a society that puts such people in places of power. Knowing what was to come in their homeland, Germany, in the next decade, makes their work even more eerily prescient. They framed their story with the burgeoning ideas of psychology – Freud's seminal work, *A General Introduction to Psychoanalysis*, was published just three years before and was the talk of the European intelligentsia, particularly his use of hypnotism as a method of exploring the human mind. They lined their story with questions of madness, societal mayhem, and a sleepwalker-turned-murderer by a mad scientist.

Thus, the silent film, *The Cabinet of Dr. Caligari*, came into being. According to most film historians, it's now considered the first horror movie. By contemporary standards, the story may seem very mild... quaint, even. And yet, this work set a standard that permeated this new medium of film. *Time Magazine* recently named it as one of the most influential movies of the past century, and rightfully so....the extreme visual design of the costumes, make-up and sets are considered landmarks of German Expressionism, the camera angles used to heighten the sense of dread were developed further in movies such as *Nosferatu* (1922), *Frankenstein* and *Dracula* (both 1931), and have been quoted as inspiration by contemporary directors such as George Romero, Tim Burton, and Guillermo del Toro. The trope of a "monster" carrying the prone body of a damsel-in-distress over the rooftops didn't start with *King Kong* (1933), but with *Caligari*. The tell-tale shuffle of a zombie didn't originate with *The Night of the Living Dead* (1968), but with *Caligari*, and the list goes on.

Why puppets? Why not? The melodrama of silent film acting lends itself to a degree of ridicule (again, by modern standards), as well as the ability to create caricature over character. The ability to lean into German Expressionism as a visual and societal shift and to use those ideas to create the characters AS WELL AS the space, was too fun of an opportunity for the Theatre Department to pass up.

This is an off-the-wall kinda project, and I'm grateful to the students and faculty for letting us take an odd idea and run with it. We hope you enjoy!
