The pieces you will see tonight reflect the range of dance genres and practices our faculty specialize in, and demonstrate how dancemaking and performance - as methods of creative research - help us engage with and make sense of the world.

Rati Vilaap: Exploring Stages of Grieving

Using mythological sketches, stages and modes of grief are explored in four acts. Act I: Sambhrama borders on delirium, Act II: Smarana rests on remembrance, Act III: Tandava ushers in total destruction, and Act IV: Vilaap describes the state of acceptance with mourning. The story is borrowed from the iconic ancient poet Kalidasa where the protagonist Rati mourns the loss of her beloved. Vilaap means crying out loud. The piece showcases Shilpanatanam (meaning moving imagery), which is a compositional technique and creative process envisioned by Kulkarni. Funded by Sarkar's NEA grant "ShilpaNatanam: A New Vocabulary in Indian Dance," Rati Vilaap has both solo and duet avatars jointly created with Martha Graham Company virtuoso Blakeley WhiteMcguire.

The Browne's Ferry neighborhood, like many University area neighborhoods, was developed in the late 1980s and 1990s as a racially and ethnically diverse middle-class neighborhood. In addition, it is home to the transplanted Grace A.M.E. Zion Church, whose congregation moved from their historic church in the Brooklyn/Second Ward neighborhood in 2006. Based on oral histories, mapping and historical land research, and demographic research, a multidisciplinary creative team is creating musical, video, and choreographic works capturing stories of Browne's Ferry and Brooklyn for public presentation in May 2024. The project team includes: Nadia M. Anderson (Architecture), Mira Frisch (Music), Ashley L. Tate (Dance), and Meg Whalen (CoA+A), with members of Grace A.M.E. Zion Church and the Browne's Ferry Community, the Charlotte Strings Collective, YUNG Citizen, Marlon Morrison, and additional community artists. Tonight's performance serves as a teaser for the upcoming productions.

Faculty Biographies

E.E. Balcos (Professor, he/him), Filipino-American and native Minnesotan, is Professor of Dance, performer, choreographer, and somatic movement educator. He holds a BA in Music from The Colorado College and an MFA in Choreography from The University of Iowa. He is a Registered Somatic Dance Educator (RSDE) and a Master Somatic Movement Educator (MSME). Balcos is passionate about somatic movement practice, primarily Body-Mind Centering®, and its application in dance and the creative process. He is an active member of the Body-Mind Centering® Association (BMCA) and the International Somatic Movement Education and Therapy Association, (ISMETA) and is on the Board of Directors. Balcos is also a founding member of the dance company Movement Migration.

Audrey Baran (Visiting Assistant Professor, she/her) is a Filipina-American Charlotte-based dance maker, performer, and educator. She holds an MFA in Dance from Hollins University and a BA in Dance and Graduate Certificate in Anti-Racism in Urban Education from UNC Charlotte. Baran was a selected choreographer for the 2022 Joffrey Ballet's Winning Works and Charlotte Ballet's Innovative: Direct from the LAB 2021. She has presented work in the Richmond Dance Festival, FEMMEfest, NDEO Conference, Bill Evans Somatic Dance Conference, NC Dance Festival, Tobacco Road Dance Productions, Triangle Dance Project, Ladyfest CLT, and Charlotte Dance Festival. Baran is the founder / artistic director of multifaceted contemporary dance company and nonprofit organization, Baran Dance.

Kaustavi Sarkar (Assistant Professor, she/her) an Odissi (eastern Indian traditional art form) practitioner/scholar, under the tutelage of Guru Poushali Mukherjee, Ratikant Mohapatra, and Sujata Mohapatra, grounds her practice within Indian philosophy, religious studies, South Asian aesthetics, technology studies, and critical cultural studies. Her book projects Dance Technology Social Justice with McFarland Publishers and Shaping S-Curves with University of North Carolina publishers establish her as an authority in the field of South Asian Dance Studies. Through her Dance and Community Research Institute, a worldwide network of professionals, she has won state/ federal grants standardizing dance education, creating professional-development opportunities, and organizing conferences.

Ashley L. Tate (Assistant Professor, she/her) is a director, choreographer. educator, and performer from Saint Louis, Missouri. She is the founder, artistic director, and executive director of Ashleyliane Dance Company. Tate received her MFA in Dance from Washington University in St. Louis, where she was a recipient of the Spencer T & Ann W. Olin Fellowship for Women in Graduate Study. In addition to various cities in the state of Missouri, her choreographic work has been featured in showcases in New York City, Las Vegas, Chicago, Boulder, Santa Monica, and Atlantic City. She teaches master classes and workshops in Hip Hop, contemporary, jazz, house dance, improvisation, and composition. She is the co-producer of Dance the Vote, a non-partisan grassroots arts-based voter registration initiative founded by Joan Lipkin, and is a key participant in the nationally recognized No Tears Project, a multidisciplinary festival designed to honor Civil Rights history. Her current research interests include the use of dance as a vehicle for community advocacy and social change, as well as the visual, auditory, and kinesthetic benefits of Hip Hop music and movement.

Guest Artist Biographies

Jim Coleman (he/him) is an American musician who plays keyboards and sampler. He was a member of the 1990s noise Cop Shoot Cop and afterwards worked as a solo musician specializing in instrumental electronic music and film scores. The Children... is a loose collective initially formed and maintained by Jim Coleman and Michael Wiener. Contributing members include Phil Puleo, Kirsten McCord, John Nowlin and Rock Savage. Their live shows are sprawling, experiential and theatrical, integrating song structure, improv, performance and projections. Jim also composes also under the name of Phylr.

Rahquelah Conyers (she/her) is an Asheville native with a love for performance and art that explores the commonalities and intricacies of human nature. Her movement and creations are a culmination of her studies in Psychology, Sociology, Human Sexuality, and Dance at UNC Charlotte. She is a former member of Moving Spirits Inc. and an active company member of Baran Dance, incorporating her training in Modern, West African, African Brazilian, and Commercial Dance into her practice. She is motivated by collaboration with artists outside of dance to create expansive art that continues to seek out venues that can make a difference.

Sharon Dunson (she/her) has been a company member of Baran Dance for five years. Since graduating from Scripps College (2017) she has enjoyed learning and growing in various dance styles. In 2022, Sharon had her choreographic debut in *Baran Dance: Tiny Dances*. She has performed with the company in various local projects including the Charlotte International Arts Festival and Queen City Nerve's "Best of the Nest" (2023).

Tal Halevi (she/her) is a choreographer, dancer, and teacher based in New York City. Born and raised in Israel, she was a member of the Rina Schenfeld Dance Theater in Tel Aviv and performed with choreographers Nimrod Freed, Jeanette Stoner, and with the New York Theater Ballet. Her choreography, exploring the interplay of physical embodiment, shifting states of consciousness, and their expression through movement, has been presented in Europe, Israel, Canada, and the United States. A registered somatic movement educator and a certified teacher and practitioner of Body-Mind Centering®, she leads workshops on using somatic practices for dance-making.

Kate Micham (she/her), based in Charlotte since 2009, has been honored to work and perform, both on stage and in film, with some of the area's most talented artists including Audrey Baran, Megan Payne, and Lauren Bickerstaff. As a Baran Dance contemporary company member and contributing choreographer the last 11+ years, Kate has performed in the Democratic National Convention, North Carolina Dance Festival, Tobacco Road Dance Productions, Hollins MFA Thesis Presentation, LadyFest, Wine & Dance, etc. Her choreography has been featured in Baran Dance shows, the North Carolina Dance Festival, TEDxCharlotte, Charlotte Dance Festival, Women's Showcase of Charlotte, and LadyFest 2023.

Montë Murphy (he/they) is an Ethnochoreologist and Artist-Activist native of Raleigh, NC, leading his work with the voices and stories of his ancestors. His work focuses on exposing creative arts to underserved communities and exposing them to somatic practices for wellness. He is an archivist and preserver of Africanist cultural practices and traditions. He creates safe spaces for artistic exploration through dance education and amplifies inclusivity of the the voices of BIPOC communities. He is grateful to curate positive impacts for the community through his non-profit of A Brotha's

Luv in Motion, inc, where he expands his art into community wellness in the form of healing arts. Murphy attended UNC Charlotte, where he practiced dance scholarship, social practice, wellness, and advocacy. He has educated ages K-12, adults, persons with disabilities, and continues to increase his options of supporting the community through presenting at festivals, workshops, and conferences.

Julia Peterson (she/her) is a graduate of UNC Charlotte and a company member with Baran Dance. Prior to her time at Charlotte, she became part of the middle dance team for two years. She later became an apprentice for the Wanda Dance Company at Northwest School of the Arts for High School. Upon graduating high school, Julia attended UNC Greensboro and Central Piedmont Community College but found her true home at UNC Charlotte. She is excited for what is to come in the future.

Ali Roth (she/her) grew up in North Alabama where she trained in various styles and performed in productions such as Oklahoma!, Aladdin, The Wizard of Oz and more. She performed every role in The Nutcracker from sheep to Sugar Plum during her tenure at Dancer's Inc. Ali graduated from the University of Alabama with a Bachelors of Arts in Dance in 2019. During her time in school she choreographed and performed in, Dance Alabama! and Alabama Repertory Dance & Theatre and then studied at Broadway Dance Center's professional Semester in New York City. Ali returned to Birmingham, AL to join Formations Dance Company and is now in her third season as a company member of Baran Dance in Charlotte, NC.

Margery Segal (she/her) is a Performer/Dancer/Healer and a Therapist of Somatic/Developmental Movement, Pre/Perinatal Birth, Body-Mind Centering® & Body-Centered Psychotherapy, residing in Austin, Texas. She danced professionally in NYC in the Dance-Performance companies of Stephanie Skura, Yoshiko Chuma, Nina Martin and the London-based Gaby Agis plus numerous others. As a Choreographer/Writer/ Deviser, she is the Artistic Director of the Austin based Dance Performance company: Margery Segal/NERVE/Performance- creating large scale onsite performance works as well as tightly woven dance-plays that explore the character's experiences with mammalian survival in challenged landscapes.
