This work is inspired by energy centers in the body called chakras. In Sanskrit a chakra means "wheel" or "disc". Choreographer Biographies

E.E. Balcos (Professor), Filipino-American and native Minnesotan, is Professor of Dance, performer, choreographer, and somatic movement educator. He holds a BA in Music from The Colorado College and an MFA in Choreography from The University of Iowa. He is a Registered Somatic Dance Educator (RSDE) and a Master Somatic Movement Educator (MSME). Balcos is passionate about somatic movement practice, primarily Body-Mind Centering, and its application in dance technique and performance, interdisciplinary collaboration, contact improvisation, and choreography. He is an active member of the Body-Mind Centering Association (BMCA) and the International Somatic Movement Education and Therapy Association, (ISMETA) and is on the Board of Directors.

Kim Jones (Associate Professor) is a choreographer, dancer, régisseur for the Martha Graham Center, and artistic director of Movement Migration. Born and raised in NYC, she earned an MFA from FSU and a BFA from Marymount Manhattan College. Kim danced with the Martha Graham Dance Company, The Metropolitan Opera, and as a principal dancer in U.S. National Broadway tours. She's renowned for her scholarly reconstruction of Paul Taylor's Tracer (1962) for the Paul Taylor American Modern Dance Company and Imperial Gesture (1935) for the Martha Graham Dance Company. Kim is a two-time National Endowment for the Arts grant recipient and a recent NEH recipient. Nationally she has presented her work at the Metropolitan Museum of Art, Museum of Modern Art (MoMA), Fashion Institute of Technology, and the Joyce Theater. Internationally, she has presented in South Korea, Mexico, U.K., and Italy. Kim's contributions to dance reconstruction have been published in respected journals. She leads study abroad programs in Italy and the U.K. for UNC Charlotte students. Kim is a current research fellow at the Jerome Robbins Dance Division at the NY Public Library.

Delia Neil (Interim Associate Dean for Academic Affairs/Associate Professor of Dance) holds a BA degree from Butler University and an MFA degree from UNC Greensboro. She is an American Ballet Theatre Certified Teacher and a Certified Pilates Mat Instructor. Her ballet training included study in the Cecchetti, the Royal Academy of Dancing, and Vaganova

teaching methods. Her professional training included scholarship study at the Harkness House for the Ballet Arts (NYC) with David Howard and 10 years of study with renowned teacher Gabriella Taub-Darvash. She performed as a soloist with the Cincinnati Ballet and Baltimore Ballet Companies. Ms. Neil is an award winning professional choreographer receiving numerous grants from the North Carolina Arts Council and various research grants from the university. She choreographs classical and contemporary ballet works as well as choreography for dramatic theatrical productions and musicals.

Tamara Williams (Associate Professor/Director of Undergraduate Studies) earned her MFA from Hollins University in collaboration with Frankfurt University. Her choreography has been presented internationally in Serbia, Switzerland, Germany, Trinidad, Jamaica, Mexico, Benin and Brazil. Moving Spirits, Inc., Williams' contemporary arts organization, is dedicated to performing, researching, documenting and producing African Diaspora arts. Williams' scholarly work includes: the award-winning manuscript, *Giving Life to Movement: The Silvestre Dance Technique*; "Reviving Culture Through Ring Shout," published in *The Dancer-Citizen*; and *The African Diaspora and Civic Responsibility* (forthcoming). In 2022, she received the NC Dance Festival Trailblazer Award.

Martha Graham (1895-1991) is recognized as a primal artistic force of the 20th century, alongside Picasso, James Joyce, Stravinsky, and Frank Lloyd Wright. *TIME* magazine named Martha Graham "Dancer of the Century," and *People* magazine named her among the female "Icons of the Century." As a choreographer, she was as prolific as she was complex. Graham created 181 ballets and a dance technique that has been compared to ballet in its scope and magnitude. Her approach to dance and theater revolutionized the art form and her innovative physical vocabulary has irrevocably influenced dance worldwide. Martha Graham's extraordinary artistic legacy has often been compared to Stanislavsky's Art Theatre in Moscow and the Grand Kabuki Theatre of Japan, for its diversity and breadth. Her legacy is perpetuated in performance by the Martha Graham Dance Company and Graham 2, and by the students of the Martha Graham School.

About the Department of Dance

The Department offers Bachelor of Arts degrees in Dance with concentrations in Dance Education, Applied Dance, or Performance, Choreography, and Theory.
